

ROUND 2 HANDOUT -- GERMAN SAUSAGE TRIVIA

In puzzle circles, a German Sausage is a puzzle type with a set of clues to short answers and a set of clues to long answers, where the long answers are a combination of 2 short answers anagrammed together (ground up like sausage). For example, if answers to clues 1 and 2 (in the left column) are SAMPLE and CREOLE, the answer to clue 1+2 (in the right column) might be MELROSE PLACE (SAMPLE and CREOLE mixed together). The sausage will loop back on itself at the end -- the last long answer will be short answers 13 and 1 anagrammed together.

Unlike a typical German Sausage, the items here tend to be trivia rather than just definitions. It's possible to answer all of the clues correctly without using the wordplay at all, but the wordplay might help fill in some of the items (if any) you do not get from the clues alone.

One item has an alternate answer that also works (and will be accepted). Scoring is 1 point per correct answer in the 26 bolded boxes below.
